

# What is sexual assault?

Test your knowledge



Sexual assault is defined as "any type of sexual contact or behavior that occurs without the explicit consent of the recipient."

- Rape: Forced sexual contact with someone who does not or cannot consent.
- Attempted rape: An unsuccessful effort to have forced sexual contact without consent.
- Child molestation: Any sexual contact with a child.
- Fondling: touching the private body parts of an individual without consent.
- Incest: Sexual contact between family members who are too closely related to marry.

- **Sexual harassment**: Unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, other verbal, visual, or physical conduct of a sexual nature; sexual innuendo; offensive jokes; and repeated unwanted invitations.
- Stalking: Following and unexpectedly showing up to track an individual, threaten, or cause fear.
- Sexual Abuse: the sexual assault of children or other instances of ongoing sexual assault perpetrated by a person in a position of trust or intimacy.
- **Cyberstalking**: Electronically mail or electronically communicate to another repeatedly, whether or not conversation ensues, to threaten, terrify or harass.

- Same Sex Sexual Assault: When the victim and the perpetrator are of the same gender.
- Forcible Sodomy: Forcible sexual contact with the mouth and the anus.
- Obscene Electronic Communications: Any comment, request, suggestion or proposal by means of telecommunication or electronic communication which is obscene, lewd or lascivious with intent to abuse, threaten or harass any party to a telephone conversation, telecommunication or electronic communication.
- Dating Violence: A pattern of abusive and coercive behaviors used to maintain power and control over a former or current intimate partner.




#### Who are the SURVIVORS?

# In the South there exists the "Bible Belt" culture



This culture favors words from the Bible to define the roles of the male and female in a marriage.

It gives men permission to misuse and exploit their roles to dominate women, expecting complete submission.

From this perception, the "Bible Belt" culture promotes and encourages male privilege.

Male privilege is the impression that social, economic, and political advantages or rights are made available to men solely because of their sex; thus, staging the breeding ground for sexual violence.

# CORE SERVICES

Service	Goal	Activities
<b>24-Hour Hotline:</b> Telephone hotline services that are available 24/7.	Provide immediate assistance to caller.	Active listening, address immediate needs, manage coping skills, provide emotional support.
Information and Referral: Timely response to requests for information and assistance related to sexual violence.	Provide the person with specialized sexual violence related information and resources.	Referrals to other service providers to support survivors (e.g. therapists, housing, legal assistance, etc.)
Crisis Intervention: Timely response to victim in a crisis of sexual violence to address immediate needs.	Reduce the level of trauma by strengthening coping skills.	Empathic listening, address safety concerns, reactions to trauma, explore immediate needs and options.
Advocacy/ Accompaniment: In-person personal support and acting on behalf of victims.	Provide support, services and knowledge through relevant systems and providers.	Educate and accompany through the medical and justice system and assist in making informed decisions.
Community Awareness/ Outreach: Inform public about sexual violence, programs and services.	Increase community's awareness and knowledge about available programs and services.	Community involvement, educating multiple systems of care through networking and collaboration.



# ENHANCED SERVICES

Service	Goal	Activities
System Coordination: Development of relationships with programs/providers in providing an array of essential services.	Develop client-centered comprehensive continuum of services for all victims.	Participation in multi-disciplinary teams to promote effective relationships with diverse agencies.
Counseling/Support Groups: Individual and group guidance that assist in understanding the effects and responses to trauma.	Assist in private and/or group settings in finding trauma centered resolutions in recovery.	Exploring and validating feelings, non- judgmental environment, solution or action focused.
Prevention Education: Inform diverse systems how to address effective strategies in preventing sexual violence.	Increase awareness through institutions providing knowledge and education.	Raise community awareness by education, skill building, campaigns, distribution of materials and presentations.





Mental health condition that is triggered by a terrifying event.



More than common feelings of temporary sadness.

Can affect a person's outlook, which can lead to feelings of hopelessness.

This, in turn, can impact his or her thought process and ability to make decisions

- Prolonged sadness
- Feelings of hopelessness
- Unexplained crying
- Changes in appetite
- Significant weight loss or gain
- Loss of energy
- Loss of interest and pleasure in activities previously enjoyed






In some instances of dissociation, people may find themselves daydreaming.

But in situations where dissociation is chronic and more complex it may impair an individual's ability to function in the "real" world, such as not being able to focus on work related duties or being able to concentrate on schoolwork.

Refers to feeling like one has "checked out" or is not present.






Many people who go through traumatic events have difficulty adjusting and coping for a while.

But with time and support, such traumatic reactions usually get better.

#### It is common for a survivor of sexual violence to experience an array of feelings:



There is no "correct" way to react to these experiences, and each person who experiences a traumatic event responds differently.

## Impact of Sexual Assault

Responses to the trauma of sexual assault will differ based on many factors operating in the victim's life.

### Responses to the trauma of sexual assault will differ based on many factors operating in the victim's life:

the individual's personal circumstances

interventions offered to the victim

degree of safety felt before the trauma

prior abuse history


available support networks and services

degree of safety felt after the trauma

relationship to the perpetrator

quality and accessibility of care

community
attitudes and values
about sexual assault

who they are, what they learned about sex and/or sexual assault in the process of growing up, how supportive their friends and family are, and whether they received professional help and appropriate intervention.

The effects of sexual assault aren't always easy to deal with, but with the right help and support they can be managed.
